## Camp Report Rangers and Rovers

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### Day 1:

The participants arrived at the camp site at 10.00 AM and the camp started with a prayer. The trainers gave a brief introduction to the history of how this movement was started and the different levels that exist in our country. It was then followed by separation of participants into 6 patrols (3 Rangers team and 3 Rovers team). The patrol teams were then trained about flag hoisting, theme song and salutation.

In the afternoon session the trainers introduced the 14 ideals that one expects from a Ranger/Rover to be part of Bharat Scouts and Guides movement in India. The trainers also briefed about the different awards that the participant can become eligible once he/she completes the training. The trainers also conducted skill development programs in the evening to develop different skills.

After the supper, the participant took part in camp fire. The trainers introduced the concept of camp fire to the students and the meaning it has within the movement. All the participants took part with a lot of enthusiasm. The participants then went to their room to sleep with orders that everyone should be ready for exercise at 6.30 AM the next day

### Day 2:

The day started with exercise at 6.30 AM, which went on upto 7.00 AM. After a small break the participants took part in an all-faith prayer for 20 minutes. The patrol teams then participated in flag hoisting. The trainers then gave introduction to different aspects of this movement and encouraged the participants to share their opinion.

After the lunch the Rovers patrol teams were given task to make tea with just two matchsticks with the condition that they should not blacken the vessel neither should they leave any mark on the tree. The Rangers patrol teams were given the task of boiling potatoes without using any water. All the participants took part actively and it turned out be a unforgettable exercise.

The meeting then concluded at 3.15 PM with a prayer. Overall the camp turned out to be a memorable event to cherish for the rest of our lives.
